The work going on to Fix the Floor of the church is continuing apace, under the watchful eye of the amazing Michael Drew. Those who called in during the Open Church afternoon were amazed at the original construction of the church, visible due to the fact that a metre of cement, clay and rubble had been dug out in readiness for the block and beam floor to go down.

We were able to study the foundations and the incredible inverted underground arches supporting the big pillars down the aisles, as well as the underground Cotswold stone walls supporting the outer walls of the entire building.

# **Breach Wood Update**

As the winter pruning season approaches, I thought an update might be helpful, to warn Breach Wood users what to expect. Most of the trees are now sufficiently tall to be out of reach for "formative pruning" (persuading them to grow tall and straight). The next stage is to start selective culling, where crowns of adjacent trees are in contact (the jargon is "canopy closure"), and the trees compete directly with each other for space, and light. The oaks have reached this stage, so we plan to remove the smaller ones, leaving space for the rest to flourish. Depending on how long it takes, about three hundred will get the chop this winter. Where we have two large oaks next to one another, one will have to go.....tough choices, as we have been lovingly pruning and nurturing these trees for 15 years.

The Trustees will attempt to carry out this work, gradually, over the winter months, but we might call for a WORK DAY in early 2018, if we run out of time. This will involve trimming and sorting the trees that have been felled, leaving neat rows of branches, and even neater piles of timber. All the stands of oak need thinning in this way, and it might take us a couple of winters to work our way through the whole woodland.

The other major tree species in Breach Wood is Ash. Sadly the majority of our ash trees have been infected by the fungus Chalara, otherwise referred to as "Ash Dieback". The prediction of experts is that nearly all the ash trees we planted in Breach Wood will perish, a process that will take a few years. You may have noticed that many of the ash are already looking sickly. The advice is to leave infected trees standing, until they are finally dead. The few that survive will be those that have natural resistance to the disease, and their offspring will eventually repopulate Breach Wood. Meanwhile, we will have to get used to seeing large sections of Breach Wood populated by dead-looking trees. We will not be cutting out any dead ash this winter, as our hands will be full with the oak-thinning work, but eventually we will remove all the dead ash, and replant with other tree species, to fill the void.

Other winter work will involve clearing Brambles, and Old Man's Beard, machine-trimming the boundary hedges, restoring the sign, and coppicing one of the Hazel coppices. **We are always looking for volunteers.** 

Apart from the setback with the Ash, the woodland has had a good season. The wildflowers are flourishing...sainfoin, bird's-foot trefoil, fireweed, ragged robin, corn cockle, many types of clover, to mention but a few. Our wild orchid population is now up to 5 individual plants. Insects, too, lots of butterflies (skippers, meadow browns, marbled whites, mainly), bumble bees, honey bees, grasshoppers, beetles, spiders, ants, and a few giant caterpillars of the elephant hawk moth( feeding on the fireweed). All this insect activity is becoming a magnet for birds, and it was good to see the yellow-hammers nesting there again this summer.

Plenty of deer too, and badgers and foxes, and voles aplenty....and the ravens from Wilcote occasionally overhead. And bats...we put up three bat-boxes in Breach Lane a couple of years ago.

Breach Wood is there not just for the trees, although they naturally dominate our attention. The spaces between, and beneath, the trees, and the rides and pathways and hedgerows, all contribute to the enjoyment of sharing Breach Wood with so many other living things, even if many of them go un-noticed. Together, they all modestly contribute to the pleasure of a few minutes spent in our community woodland.

Generators

Temporary heating and cooking appliances


